What is going on in each Class?

Math

In Grade 7, students will recognize and represent proportional relationships between units. They will compute unit rates from given ratios and will see their use in real life.

In Grade 8, students will continue learning about solving real-world problems involving calculation with numbers in Scientific Notation. Students will also begin solving one and two steps equations.

Students in both grade levels are encouraged to continue using different platforms for online learning (iReady, MobyMax, and Khan Academy)

Language Arts

In Grade 7, students will continue to work on building reading skills by practicing inferencing and exploring strategies that can be used to determine meaning in context. Students are encouraged to read daily at home and study for vocabulary quiz using "Quizlet."

In grade 8, we have been focusing on writing skills. We finally have access to PEG and students will begin their first essay using this program. We're working on understanding and identifying the six traits of writing, and editing and revising. We have used PEG lessons and Flocabulary for independent practice. Please continue to encourage your child to work on ELA skills at home, by reading on MyOn, studying on Quizlet (danielle_persico), and now writing on PEG (MIWrite.net).

Social Studies

In Grade 7, students will be going into more research with bodies of water-specifically oceans, and introducing map skills and our zombie apocalypse project.

In Grade 8, students will be finishing their research and presentations on the Revolutionary War and will begin learning about World War II.

Science

It is Science Fair time. Students are encouraged to work daily with parental guidance on their science fair projects.

In Grade 7, students are analyzing data to infer the relationship between objects in motion relative to their mass and position.

In Grade 8, students are understanding how traits are inherited and passed on to offspring.

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Did you know?

- Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
